However, my anxiety did not stop, I was so worried all the time and the only reason I continued teaching was that I knew that it was beneficial for my personal and professional development and my CV of course (hahahah).



That was my first 4 months of teaching – constant anxiety and stress. Fortunately, my 2nd school year of teaching started and somehow everything was gone. Honestly, I was so amazed by myself and the way I was teaching and how confident I was. It was like magic to me. Obviously, everything has its reason and the reason behind that sudden shift was the fact that I was not the same freshly graduated schoolgirl I used to be. I gained knowledge and more importantly experience. As for now, I love my job, I love the school, I love the people I am working with there and the students I am teaching. These kids inspire me to not stop believing in myself and that I can do everything, because that is the power of the teachers in their students' eyes. I am happy that I was offered this opportunity, I accepted it and most importantly, I did not give up doing it, because now I would not be the person I am now. I love you kids, this article is written thanks to your positive energy, interest and joyful moments during our classes. I hope this article find the right people, who are feeling lost or unmotivated, and it manages to bring even a little bit hope during your hard times!

## The bridge between generations

We met **Victoria Mileva** - Vicky 8 years ago, when she went with a spray can in her hands to paint graffiti in the Obelya district of Sofia. Vicky, a fourteen-year-old young person at the time, had no idea of the current regulations and penalties for painting graffiti. We saved her from a number of troubles. Since then, timidly and with a smile, Vicky has gradually entered our activities and she likes it more and more. In the summer of 2025, she came to the city of V.Preslav for only one week and liked it so much that she stayed for 45 days and participated in archaeological excavations with 23 other young people from different European countries.

Vicky has exceptional kindness in her soul and has often asked the question: how can I help people in need? How can I be useful to homeless people?

Very soon after she returned to the city of Sofia, we began discussing how her energy and talents could be useful. And here she is in one of her unexpected roles: **teaching English to seniors** at the "Iskra 1964" Community Center in the West Park district of Sofia. Here's what Vicky shared:



## A flipped classroom: A lesson I taught... and the one that taught me

The first time I walked into the community center to teach English to elderly people, I was just as excited as I was nervous... I didn't know how they would react, whether they would find it interesting and I was worried that I might not be prepared well enough.

As soon as I entered, I felt that this wouldn't be just a lesson, but a shared experience – an exchange of knowledge where we all learn from one another.

I wanted to make the class as light, pleasant and interesting as possible, so we started with the alphabet song – a whole group of smiling people singing A, B, C... and just like that, my anxiety disappeared! Then we played word bingo and finally "What is this?", where they guessed different objects in English. They did amazingly well and brought so much energy into the room that I found myself feeling it too. The best part was how eager they were to learn. They already had a solid basic understanding of the language, they participated with enthusiasm and every little victory made them genuinely happy. They took notes in their notebooks, which reminded me that we all learn in the same way, regardless of age. And it wasn't just them learning from me, I was learning from them as well.

At one point, one of the women asked me how to translate the word "chitalishte" into English, and I froze for a second because I had never thought about that word before. While I was trying to come up with an answer, another woman shared that the word is actually recognized by UNESCO as part of the intangible cultural heritage.

My first lesson was truly an unforgettable shared moment. I left with a huge smile on my face, proud not only of myself, for feeling like a part of these colorful, wonderful people, but also proud of them – of their calmness, their excitement and their impressive knowledge of the subject.

I'm already looking forward to our next meeting.

After the successful and very emotional start, the group not only accepted the previous coach, his families simply "adopted" him: they invited him to watch football matches together, to visit his parents in the village on the weekend, to a family movie and ... And into this almost family idyll, Fini comes, who must replace a beloved coach, as well as adapt himself to a culture and environment terribly different from his in Morocco.

## What I Will Take From My Project in Bulgaria

When I arrived in Bulgaria, I didn't know what to expect. I came with hope, but also with uncertainty. The children already had a coach they loved, someone they trusted deeply. and the project had only started a year earlier. For the kids, I was a stranger walking into a world that wasn't mine yet.



On my first day, I did not even know their names. I did not know their positions, their strengths, their weaknesses, or their personalities. Moreover, that same day, I had to coach them in a tournament. I felt lost, confused. Moreover, a little scared. It was my very first time coaching children, and everything felt impossible. However, little by little, things changed. I started listening. I started watching. Slowly, the kids became more than just players they became individuals I cared about. I learned who was shy, who was confident, who listened, who needed encouragement, and who needed to be pushed gently. The connection grew naturally, systematically, without forcing it. Moreover, together against all odds we won the tournament for School 97. That victory was not just a trophy. It was proof of trust, teamwork, and love. From this project, I am taking something far more valuable than experience. I am taking the understanding that being a teacher is not about authority it is on heart. A teacher grows with the students. A teacher cares before instructing. A teacher leads with the heart before the whistle. I am also taking with me the lessons the children taught me: patience, empathy, and the power of sincere connection. They showed me that when you give love, trust eventually follows.

## What Impressed Me in Bulgaria

What impressed me the most in Bulgaria were the children themselves? Their ability to adapt and accept someone new was incredible. Even though I came from another country, another culture, and another background, they opened their hearts to me simply because I showed them respect and care. The spirit of the school-the energy, the passion, and the determination the kids showed every single day, also impressed me. Even when things were difficult, they pushed forward with strength and joy. Bulgaria itself impressed me too. The buildings were interesting, with a mix of modern life and old Eastern European style. I enjoyed the weather in Sofia, especially the fresh mornings and the calm afternoons. In addition, the historical monuments were beautiful every statue, every old building, and every square felt like it carried a story. And maybe the biggest surprise was how much Bulgaria changed me. I left the country more patient, more confident, and more understanding. I discovered a new part of myself thanks to those children.

Bulgaria did not only give me memories. It gave me growth, love, and a story I will carry with me forever.

# Training 2 of the CHANCE network program

Tirana (Albania), 25-26 September 2025

My name is Ivy and together with Vicky we had the opportunity to participate in an intriguing event organized by **CHANCE**.

It was a training dedicated to **the reuse of confiscated assets as a tool to support the social economy and youth employment**. It was a forum combining theory and examples that demonstrated the enormous potential of this approach – how problematic assets can be transformed into engines of significant social change.

The first day of the event was held in the capital Tirana and was dedicated to intensive discussions and practical tasks. I was assigned to a group that unanimously decided to work on my idea: creating an art center for youth (and not only) by using confiscated properties.

Since there is still a lack of working practice in this area in Bulgaria, together we came up with the proposal to consider an imaginary project. The other participants shared their real-life experience, established practices and valuable insights from their countries, which was extremely useful for me.

I received concrete feedback and guidelines for future actions. The main advice was: when applying for a similar project and seeking support from the relevant institutions, it is advisable, even if we do not have previous national experience, to apply examples of successful practices from other countries or organizations. In fact, such examples exist and they are undeniable proof of the possibilities for development. This international exchange was a key moment that enriched my knowledge and gave clear guidelines for work in the Bulgarian context.

On the second day, we saw a practical example in Elbasan - Tradita Ime Artinazale

The second day provided an opportunity to see the theory in action. We were taken to the city of Elbasan, where we were shown a visually successful renovated part of a confiscated building.

Tradita Ime Artinazale is a place where traditional textiles are produced. The walls were decorated with framed photos showing the state of the building before and after the renovation. This visual chronology clearly illustrated the huge difference between the previous ruin and the current useful, properly utilized space.

In addition to the transformation, there is also a serious economic effect here: the products produced are sold in an adjacent shop, providing a financial result from the women's labor and the use of the renovated building for a socially significant purpose.

This trip clearly showed that confiscated assets do not necessarily have to remain unused or burden the state. Through targeted management and innovative projects, they can be transformed into tools to support the social economy, provide employment and create real value for communities. The experience in Albania is a great example to follow and inspiration for future initiatives, which it would be nice to implement in Bulgaria as well.

At the Digital Citizens exhibition, one space caught the eye with its depth and professionalism – the exhibition with the results of the **Youth Connected Against Disinformation project**. The initiative, supported by the British Council and in partnership with the Association of European Journalists in Bulgaria (AEJ), gave young people a platform to confront one of the biggest threats of our time.

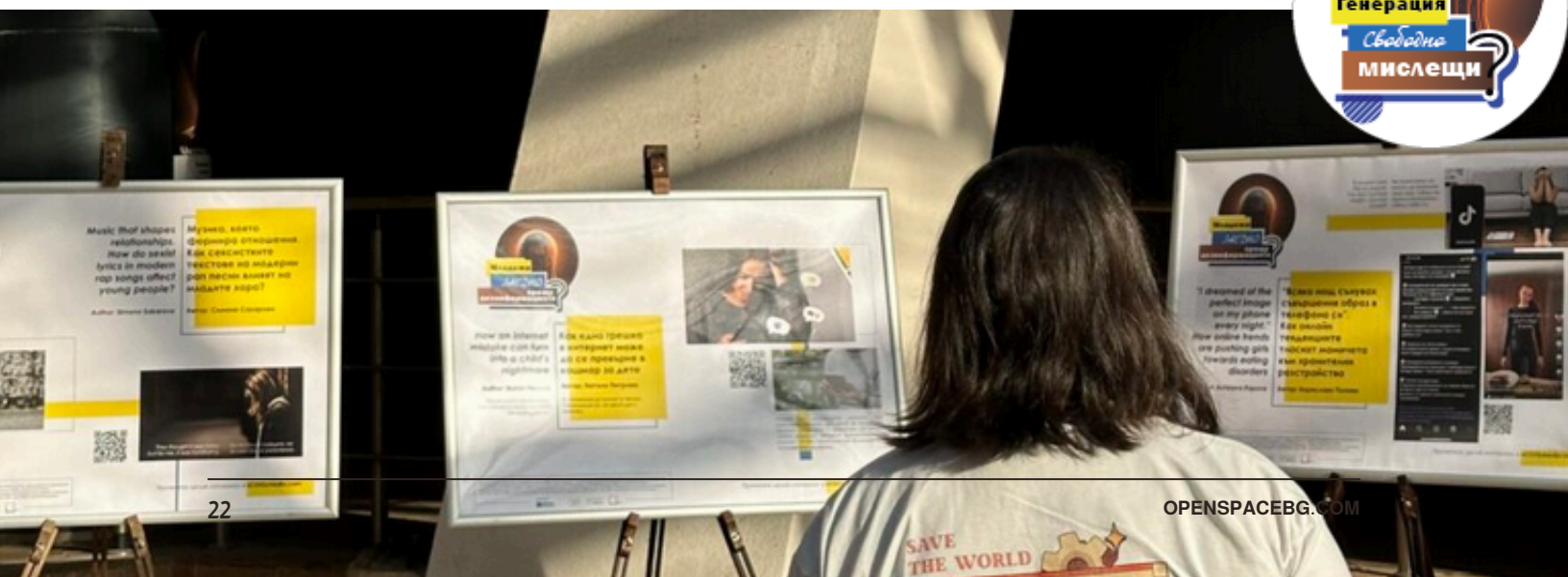
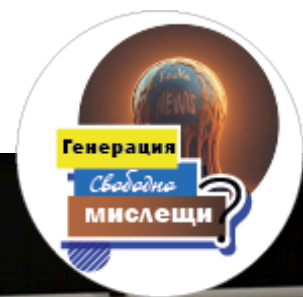
The topics that the young journalists chose are not just topical – they are painful, important and affect every generation. But what really impressed us was the approach. The articles are written extremely professionally, supported by serious analysis and iron-clad facts. We take our hats off to these young authors for the courage to delve into the details and for the discipline to check every source! Naturally, journalists from the Association of European Journalists in Bulgaria (AEJ) who were with the young people during their work remain invisible, for which we thank them very much! At a time when serious journalism is being tossed overboard, or so-called SLAP cases are being conducted to silence them, investing in young people deserves respect.

Here are the authors and their titles:

- **Borislava Popova** – “Every night I dreamed of the perfect image on my phone”. How online trends push girls towards eating disorders;
- **Simona Sakarova** – “Music that shapes relationships. How sexist lyrics of modern rap songs influence young people?”;
- **Elena Dimitrova** – “Immense distrust”. Can the state cope with online harassment against women;
- **Dilyana Stoyanova** – “Speaking up to survive: women against online violence”;
- **Valeria Pramatarova** – “Under pressure for perfection. The invisible side of online harassment against girls”;
- **Natali Petrova** – “How a mistake on the Internet can turn into a nightmare for a child?”;
- **Ivet Atanasova** – “Gossips that hurt. What dangers young people face in closed online groups”;
- **Katrin Radoslavova** – Psychological analysis of people who are capable of harassing women online;
- **Borislav Borisov** – video material with anonymized interviews with girls, victims of distribution of their private photos without consent;
- **Krasimira Yosifova** – working title of the material: “How much do you give her? Do you think they are real?”

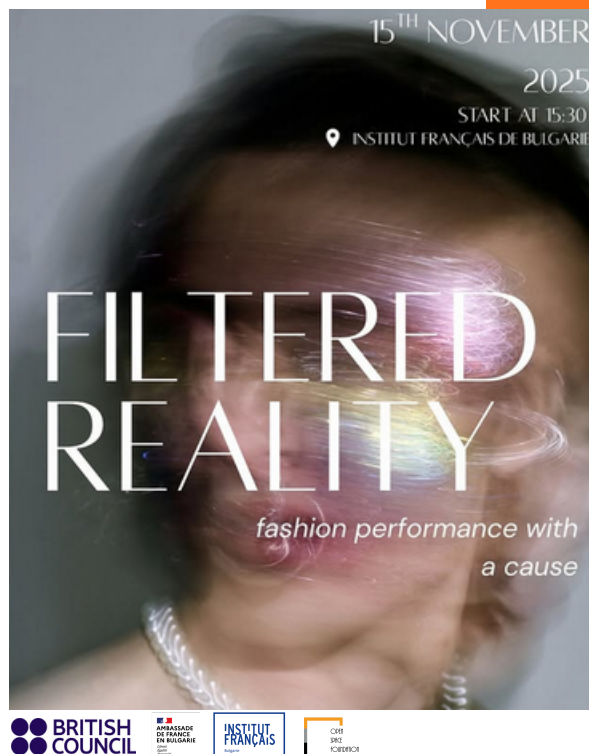
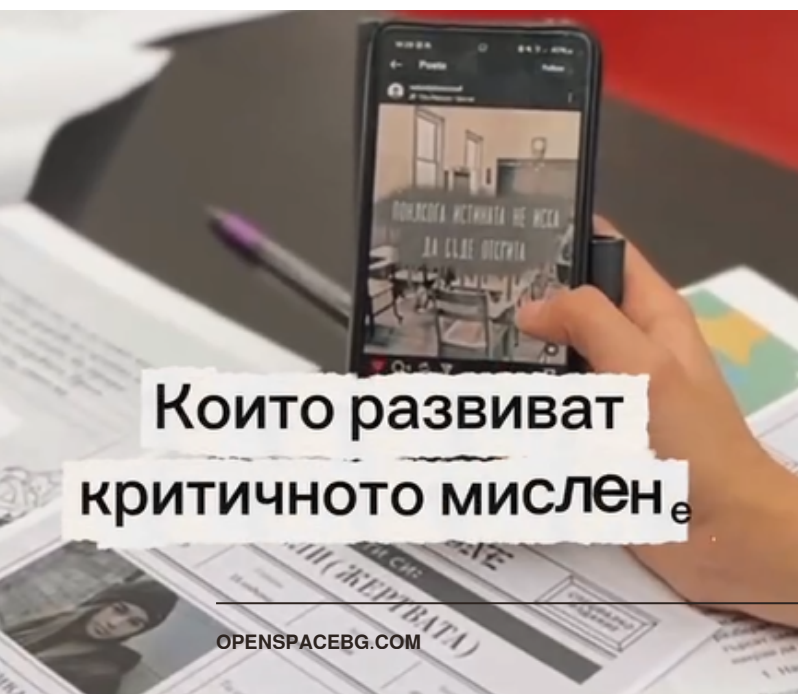




# Projects that change the rules

In addition to the articles by young journalists, it is worth telling you about some other interesting events, part of this big topic of disinformation, digital culture and media literacy. Creativity and the real problems that young people face today have made critical thinking turn into games, workshops and digital art. And this shows that the future is in good hands:

- **Board game “Offline – no filters, no hate” by Victoria Mileva:** Who says that difficult topics can't be fun? Victoria created an interactive way for young people to learn tolerance and recognize hate speech while offline – face to face, without social networks.
- **“Think critically, act logically” by Svetoslav Trifonov and classmates:** A great example of student solidarity from Dobrich! Svetoslav and his team focused their efforts on how logic and common sense are the best shield against digital illiteracy.



- **“Filtered Reality” by Tsveta Angelkova and Rada Valevska:** through a fashion show, it presents the topic of how digital filters change our perceptions of the world and ourselves. Their project reminded us of how important it is to see the truth beyond the processed footage, and the large hall of the French Cultural Institute was filled during the performance and the discussion after it.
- **“Don’t Get Caught in the Net” by Megan Krasteva and a team from Fakulteta district, Sofia:** An inspiring project that works directly in the community. Megan and her team showed that media literacy is a universal language and that everyone has the right (and need) to know how to protect themselves online.

All these young people didn't just “participate” – they created tools. They turned theory into practice that their peers can understand and use immediately. This is precisely the power of digital citizenship: **young people teaching young people.**

## What is the exhibition:

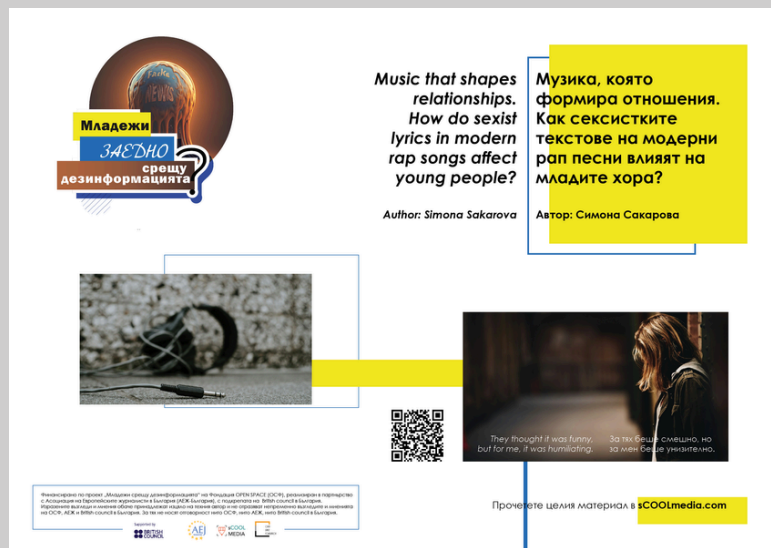
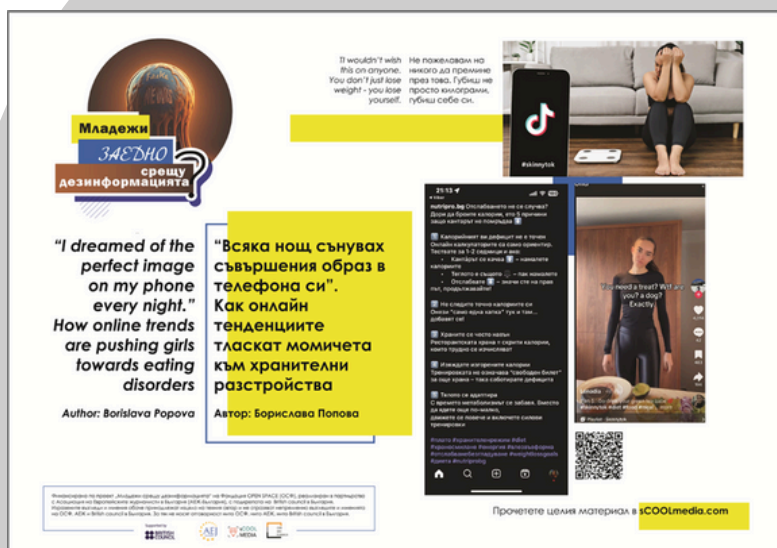
- The exhibition consists of **15 panels measuring 1.00 x 0.70 m**, printed on high-quality vinyl (you can see what they look like in the photo).

# Anti-corruption: When young people stop being "the future" and become "the now"

If 2025 has taught us anything, it is that honesty is not a luxury, but a basis for survival. In Bulgaria, the year passed under the sign of turbulent political upheavals – arrests in high-rise buildings, shaking journalistic investigations and a wave of protests that flooded the squares. And amidst this rumble, we saw something remarkable: the faces of young people.

Just a few months ago, the label on them was *"illiterate, lazy and passive"*. Suddenly, these same young people became the *"hope of the nation"*. The truth is that they have always been here, just waiting for someone to stop underestimating them and start talking to them honestly.

We have been on the move for a year: from Pazardzhik to Brussels

With the support of our partners from the international CHANCE network, in 2025 we turned anti-corruption training into a mission without borders. Our chronicle was intense:

- March: We marked March 21 (International Day of Remembrance for Victims of Organized Crime) with meetings with students in **Sofia, Pazardzhik** and **Targovishte**.
- Summer: We trained and shared experiences in **Romania** and **Albania**,
- November: We participated in conferences in **Germany** and **Greece**.
- Autumn: We conducted a training for young people in **Varna**, where we saw the hunger for knowledge on the topic.
- The finale: In December, we closed the cycle with a strategic meeting in **Brussels** to chart the way forward together with our network partners.



## "Free, not dependent": What did young people tell us?

The results of our surveys and meetings are telling: young people have a highly developed sense of justice. They do not want ready-made slogans, but tools with which to recognize corruption and oppose it. You can view the full data and conclusions from our "Free, not dependent" analysis [here](#).

## New faces in the fight for integrity

This huge amount of work would not have been possible without the growth of our team. Marta Buggio and Pepa Peneva were joined this year by Ivy and Vicky.

Vicky has already launched her author's column "Meetings with Vicky". In it, she is not just an observer, but is there - at the protests, with a camera in hand, in the heart of the events. She seeks answers from the people who took to the streets demanding honesty and integrity. Her reports are the bridge between anti-corruption theory and living life.

Our conclusion is simple: If we do not start working together with young people now, tomorrow will be no different from today. We choose to believe them.

## When stones speak to young people

Over the past three years, a project has changed not only the archaeological map of Bulgaria, but also the hearts of over 130 young people from 14 countries. The **Inherited Culture project** has proven that ancient ruins are not just a pile of stones, but a living history that needs the energy of a new generation to continue telling its secrets.

For three summers in a row, young people from Spain, the Netherlands, Poland, Italy and many more countries worked side by side at three emblematic sites in Bulgaria: the ancient capital Veliki Preslav, the mystical fortress of Misionis near Targovishte and the ancient city of Heraclea Sintica near Petrich.

However, their contribution was far from limited to fieldwork. The young people became true guardians of the heritage. They created educational games and became co-authors of a special book – a guide that translates history into the language of the future. They proved that volunteering is the shortest path to understanding the world.



On November 29, Sofia became the center of memories. Hall 1 in the Largo was filled with archaeologists, historians and participants from all over Bulgaria. The heart of the event, however, were the guests who crossed Europe to be with us – Mish from the Netherlands and Sebastian from Spain, two of the inspired co-authors of the book. As we looked at the photographs displayed in the hall, the dusty and hot summers returned with renewed vigor. We saw the smiles under the hot sun, the shared dinners and the pride of each discovery. These frames are not just photos, they are a diary of a transformative journey.

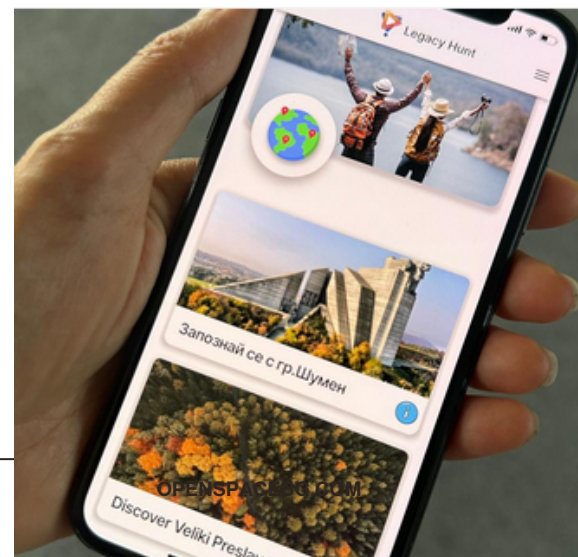
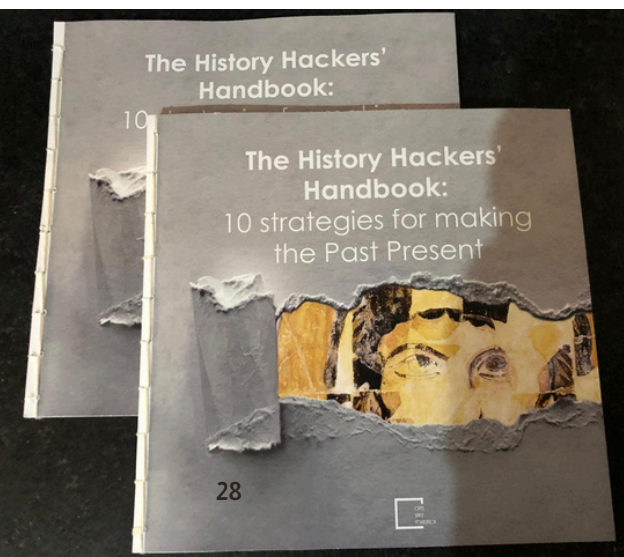
### Thank you, guardians of eternity!

## The National Museum of Natural History in Washington, D.C., USA

Our column, in which we award “Michelin stars” to museums that turn a visit into a real experience - with a dose of curiosity, knowledge and pleasure, will take you to Washington this time. The National Museum of Natural History is a true temple of knowledge that combines scientific facts with children's curiosity. It is so large that it can easily accommodate **18 football fields!** Imagine how many stories are hidden here.

As soon as we enter, we find ourselves in the world of dinosaurs. The “Deep Time Hall of Fossils” takes us back millions of years and reminds us that the Earth has gone through countless transformations - and we are only a small part of them. On the other side of the timeline is the Hall of Human Evolution, where we can follow how our distant ancestors turned into the people we are today.



The museum is also famous for its incredible collection of minerals and precious stones. The famous “Hope Diamond” is also located there - a blue diamond about which legends and myths abound. In the same hall, thousands of crystals, meteorites, and rare minerals shine, leaving visitors speechless.



**And did you know that tarantulas can live for decades?** At the museum, we met **Sally**, a 20-year-old female tarantula, who we even saw being fed. Interestingly, while females can live over 20 years, males rarely live more than 5-7. The section with live insects is designed primarily for children, but it turned out to be one of the most fun for adults too - with insects that look like leaves or twigs, and others that seem to come from another planet!

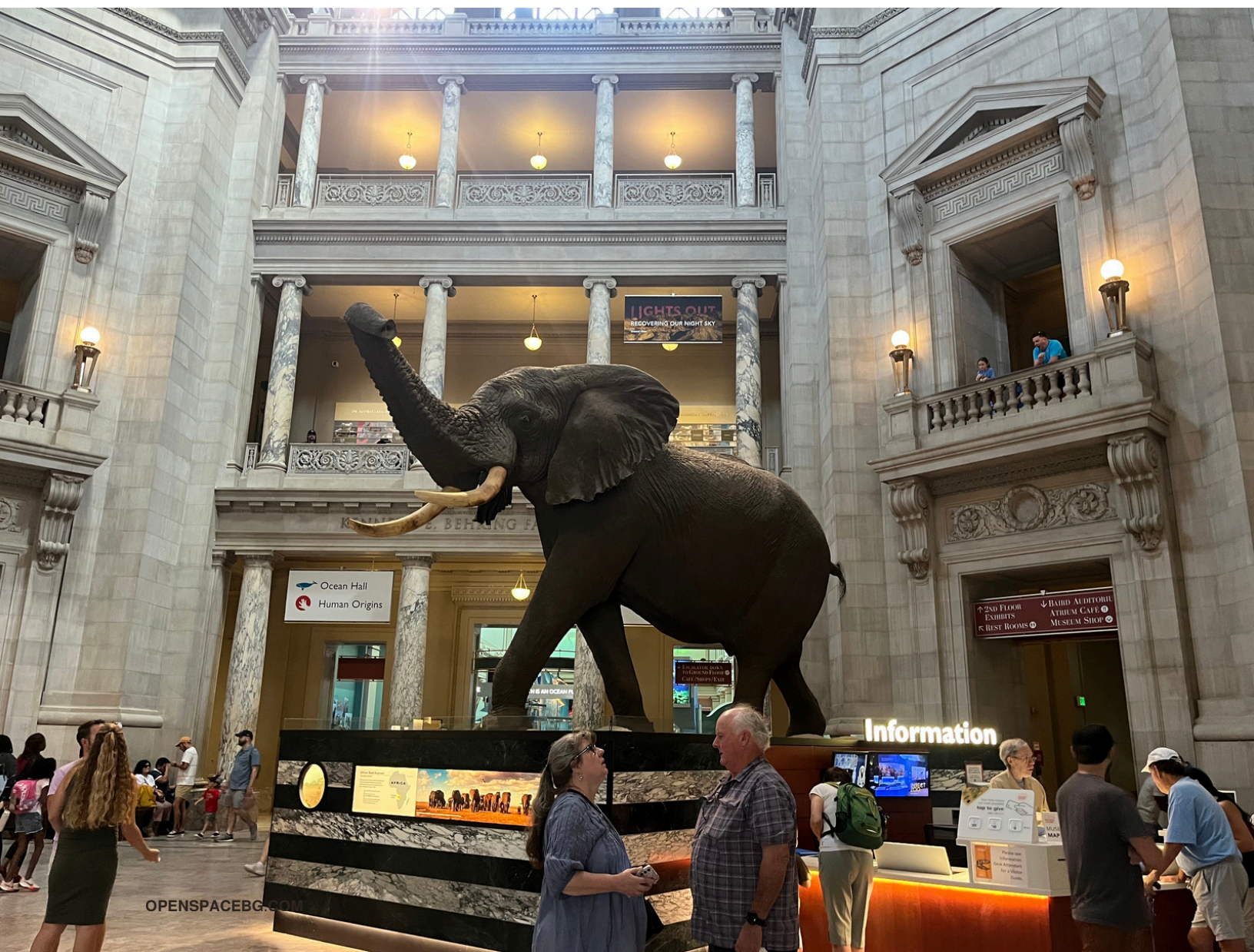

# The mirror - a reflection of human nature

For millennia, we humans have been divided between this and the other world, which is our mirror, which reflects our essence and life. Our image has always been reflected in crystal pools, in the eyes of people looking at us through the refraction of light from the sun's rays. Thus, nature introduced man to his own reflection, which gave rise to his curiosity to grow, and the mind to create new meanings, ideas and beliefs, to ask itself more and more questions. Thus, Narcissus appeared in mythical representations as an archetype of sinful vanity, born of self-love. From there, the noun **narcissism** appears and man's idea of the destructive power of reflection, creating a double and which is the border between ours and that world, which is deep and mysterious.

Thus, man himself gradually discovers material with which to create an object that creates reflections. The first mirror appeared in 6000 BC, made of polished volcanic glass - obsidian in Anatolia and was initially dark. The functions of this mirror were not only practical, but also spiritual and ritual. In 4000 BC, mirrors made of polished copper and bronze appeared in Mesopotamia, and in 3000 BC in Egypt, but they still did not have a completely crystalline reflection. In the 3rd century AD, glass mirrors with a lead coating on the back were created in Ancient Rome. In the Middle Ages, we have a layer of lead and tin impurities, creating a more convincing effect, and it was not until 1840 that the German chemist Justus von Liebig created the modern version of the silver-coated mirror.

The desire for self-knowledge has always been strong and has existed throughout all eras, and if we think about it,

Today we can see how many old beliefs, superstitions and practices in the use of mirrors are still relevant for humans. Of course, they also have a practical function - beautification. But for us there will always be a strange feeling of someone else's presence when we are alone with our image, because according to some beliefs, the mirror has the ability to remember what we see and hide many secrets, to reflect our dreams and longings, to connect us with the afterlife, to fulfill desires. In many works of folklore, literature and cinema we can see this object with a special role, including a predictive attribute, as well as a harbinger of imminent misfortune when it breaks.

Where this special object is present, many taboos appear, since it witnesses all aspects of human life, including death, therefore, in the old beliefs of people, mirrors must be covered so that the soul of the deceased is not reflected in them, which can take more souls with it.

Of course, there are not only prohibitions and terrible consequences, because the mirror can also be an apotropaic (protective) symbol. Pieces of a mirror or other shiny ornaments are placed in traditional bridal clothes, towels and brooms (they are given to the bride as a symbol of order and purity of the world, and the pieces of a mirror repel and reflect the eyes of the enemy and the one who wishes evil to the whole family).





Today, the mirror has a purely practical function, although it continues to play a ritual role in some places around the world. Mirrors in modern interior design are used to enlarge the room and illuminate dark spaces, and using this illusion, interior designers successfully create the desired result.

Another of its functions is visually corrective, visually informative and cognitive, when we practice in front of it, when we drive or put on makeup. Of course, modern cinematography also skillfully uses this tool, creating films with philosophical and psychological themes, even thrillers. The idea is self-knowledge, revealing our hidden self, the emergence of our greatest fears.

In 2010, psychologist Giovanni Caputo conducted the following experiment: "Troxler's fading effect - a perceptual phenomenon in which if you focus on one point over time, peripheral, unchanging stimuli begin to fade or disappear from view."

In conditions of low light and lack of movement (when you stare motionlessly into the mirror), the brain begins to "fill in" the blank spaces with information from its memory, which leads to these strange illusions and hallucinations."

And when you look in the mirror, do you feel anxious, afraid, or any other feelings?
